## MUM TOOK JAMES IN - AND SAYS HE CAN STAY UNTIL HE FINDS A PLACE A home for Christmas .thanks to kindly Ellie

ELLIE Crawford carried out an amazing random act of kindness after a chance meeting in a pub. Ellie, spotted a young man

drinking alone in the Foresters Arms, in Castle Road, Colchester.

She found out 18-year-old James was homeless and living at Colchester Night Shelter, so she invited him to stay with her in New Town, Colchester over Christmas.

Now the 43-year-old motherof-one has told James he can stay until Colchester Council housing officials manage to find him a flat to rent. She said: "I was sitting in the

pub after being the last person out of Sainsbury's in Stanway, on Christmas Eve. "I just wanted a quick drink

to calm down.

"I want to be able to help him back onto his feet. "He won't want to be with us

forever, but I'd love to give him the chance to restart his life.

"Nothing that's happened to him is his fault, it could happen to anyone.

"If more people help others we'd be in a better place." The teenager had been stay-

ing with Ellie and her six-yearold son, William, a few days, when William asked his mum if James could live with them.

James, who has asked us not to print his full name, is origi-nally from Hertfordshire, and became homeless in November 2011 after his mother died of cancer and his father kicked him out.

He spent time living rough in Cambridge and then Clacton, before coming to Colch-

ester in September last year. After a month, he was living in the night shelter, in Alexandra Road.

James said had been at such a low ebb before his chance meeting with Ellie, he had even tried to kill himself. He said: "I was just sitting in the pub with half a pint of lager the barman had bought me and I heard someone say: 'Hey, you in the green.

"I turned around and asked if she was talking to me and she asked me sit down.

"After that, she wouldn't let me go back to the shelter. She just said, 'come back'."

ELLIE'S gesture sets an example the rest of the country ought to follow, according to the director of the group, Kindness UK. David Jamilly founded the organisation in 2011 to promote acts of kindness. He said: "What Miss Craw-

ford has done is achievable for

anyone and is a great example

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for other people. "I think people are inherently kind, but we live in a fast-paced society and there are so many things people think they have to

do. "Being kind perhaps slips down the list of priorities."
